
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
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



FOREWORD







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

While no degree may be offered by any college giving less than four years of work, still the Junior College of St. Joseph is authorized by the State University and the State Department of Education to give associate certificates to graduating sophomores.

Sophomore students are those who have at least twenty-eight hours to their credit, or have been officially transferred from another college in which they had sophomore standing.

Students graduating from Junior College are admitted without examination to junior standing by all mid-western state universities and several eastern colleges.

Sophomore officers are elected each year by popular vote of the class. Besides sponsoring the "Ice Breaker" for the freshmen and competing with the freshmen in athletics, the sophomore class carries on few activities of its own, as all school activities are carried on jointly by the two classes.




Completing the 1931-32 season with only three games lost out of sixteen scheduled, the Griffons enjoyed one of the most successful seasons of basket ball in the school's history. This was Coach Popplewell's first year as mentor, and with a wealth of material he formed a smooth-working team. Two of the team's losses were received at the hands of powerful four-year schools, Maryville State Teachers' College and Nebraska Wesleyan of Lincoln.

The team was composed of three former lettermen and nine freshmen letter winners. The squad elected Cecil Kariker and Henry Whitaker co-captains at the beginning of the year. James Nash was basket ball manager, and Jack Herner was his assistant.

The season was opened by a decisive win over the Dentists of Kansas City by a score of 22 to 9. It was not until the second game that the Griffons' offense began to function smoothly.

The third game was carried out on Chillicothe's large court where another decisive cage duel was chalked up by a 40 to 13 score. Kariker was the offensive star of the game. Whitaker, Lewinson and Thompson rang up many of the twopointers.



Returning home for a four-game stand, the Griffons won three court battles and dropped one to the powerful Maryville Teachers. Cape Girardeau Teachers were the first to fall for a 21 to 19 count. Then the cagers from Kansas City, Kansas, Junior College suffered a 31 to 18 setback. The sixth game, a special court attraction with the Maryville Teachers, was the Griffons' first basket ball loss of the season by a score of 38 to 9. The Clarinda team met our leather-tossers in such a mood that they were unbalanced by a tally of 46 to 17. Ruley, Smith, Gibson, Thompson, Reece, Schindler, Whitaker, and Kariker starred in these encounters.

The strong Griffon cage machine annexed five more wins from Graceland, 42 to 32; Chillicothe, 36 to 21; Conception, 38 to 26; Graceland, in new Central gym, 26 to 21; Western Dental, 25 to 23; before they lost the thirteenth game to Nebraska Wesleyan by a 25 to 29 score; Clarinda was then defeated for the second time by 23 to 19, and the Griffons journeyed to Kansas City, Kansas, to lose their last game by a 27 to 24 rally of the Kansans.

Smith, Whitaker, Ruley, and Thompson were the leading scorers for the Griffon team.

Junior College placed third in the Indoor State meet held at Columbia on March 28. Biggerstaff won the shotput; Shreck set a record in the low hurdles and the relay team took third place in the 880. The Griffons scored 11 points in all.

The Griffons won second place at the Baker Relays held at Baldwin, Kansas, April 24. Ten junior colleges were entered. Shreck won the high hurdles and Biggerstaff placed first in the shotput.

Kidder Junior College secured $671/_2$ points to take a dual meet held at Cameron on April 30. Biggerstaff led the Griffons with 18 points. Ferris won the mile and half-mile events. Groh won the quarter-mile and placed second in the 220-yard dash.

Graceland College of Lamoni, Iowa, won another dual meet 63 to the Griffons' 58 on May 15. Biggerstaff was successful in the shot put. Kariker won the high hurdles. Groh took the quarter-mile event, stepping the distance in 54 seconds. Jutten placed second. In the 880, the relay team made up of Biggerstaff, Furse, Groh and Jutten, nosed out the Graceland team by only a short distance. Jimmy Nash was track manager.




A full track schedule is open to anyone in school. Each man competes individually and all points won are counted toward the intramural trophy awarded each spring.





It was last year in 1930 that the Missouri Methodist School of Nursing became affiliated with the St. Joseph Junior College. The student nurses are enrolled in a three-hour course in the chemistry department of the college under the instruction of George H. Duerksen, head of that department. In this way they receive training in a field of work for which the hospital school is not equipped.

It is believed that the Junior College is in this way giving a real service to the community by helping to train more efficient nurses for our hospitals.

The student nurses are regularly enrolled students. They pay the regular laboratory fee and a tuition fee if they are over age or live outside the city. They do not pay any activity fee and so are not permitted to take part in student activities. The course in chemistry is given merely to help the student nurses in their work, and is not given full credit by other colleges in advanced work.

The chorus was started the first semester of 1931 by Raymond Elliott, head of the music department. Before that, little interest was shown in activities of this nature. Although an attempt had been made several times before to form a chorus, it had never met with much success.

About thirty people reported for chorus when the call was issued last year. They met twice a week and voted to do their work without credit. Interest in the chorus has been extremely high from the time the first program was given. The chorus has been invited to sing at the Missouri State Teachers' convention at Kansas City next fall.


"The Admirable Crichton"
